

School-Based Access Program Services and Medical Authorization

The purpose of this Penn*Link is to remind schools who are enrolled as providers in the Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare's (Department) Medical Assistance (MA) Program of their obligation to comply with Medicaid regulations regarding the provision and billing of a School Based ACCESSS Program (SBAP) services, and to reiterate that MA regulations at Title 55 Pa. Code §1101.75 (10) state that an enrolled provider may not, except in emergency situations, either directly or indirectly render or provide a service or item without a practitioner's written order. In accordance with State Board of Education Regulations at Title 22 Pa. Code §14.131(a)(6), schools must implement the Individualized Education Program (IEP) as soon as possible, but no later than 10 school days after the IEP is completed. However, as a condition of Medicaid payment, the health-related services identified in a student's IEP must be ordered/prescribed by a practitioner, who is qualified under their licensing scope of practice, before the services are rendered. Services that occur prior to the date of the practitioner's prescription/order should not be billed to the MA Program for Medicaid payment. The qualified practitioner may use either a prescription or the SBAP Medical Authorization Form to order the health related services recommended in the IEP that he/she deems medically necessary.

The Department encourages providers, including SBAP providers, to conduct periodic self-audits to identify instances where services paid by the MA Program are not in compliance with MA Program requirements, and to voluntarily disclose the overpayments mechanism for voluntary disclosures that can be accessed online at:
